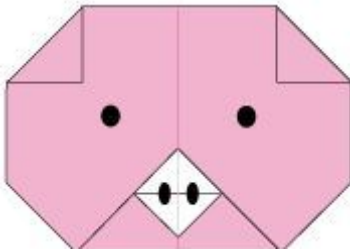
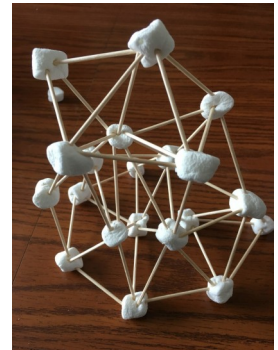
### Build It: Marshmallow Castle

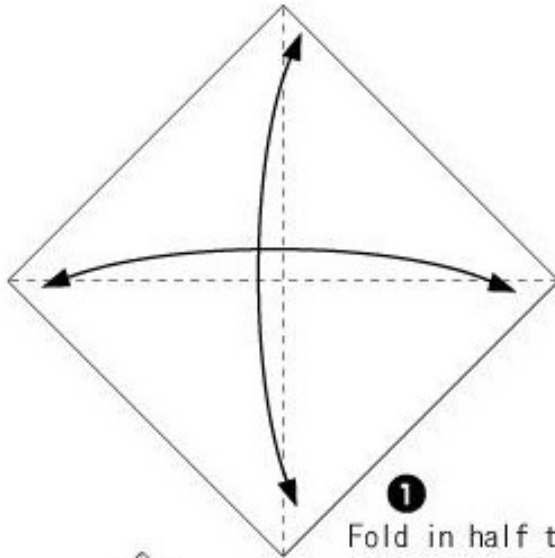

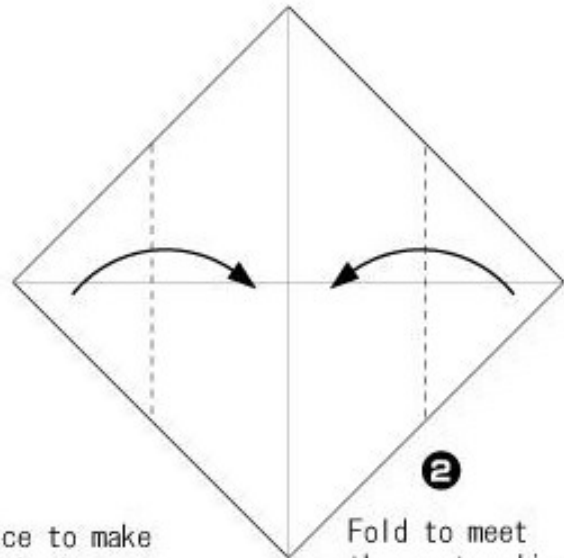

# Make an Origami Pig

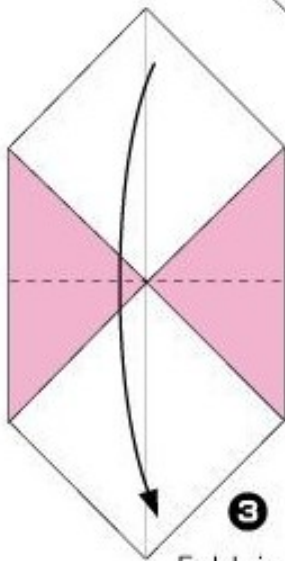
Cut a piece of paper into a square to start. Every side should be the same size. Eight inches on each side gives you enough room to maneuver the folds.



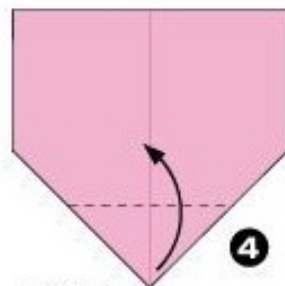
**1** Fold in half twice to make creases and fold back



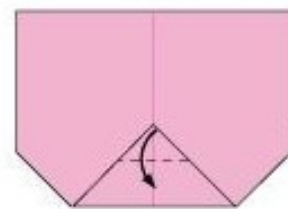
**2** Fold to meet the center line



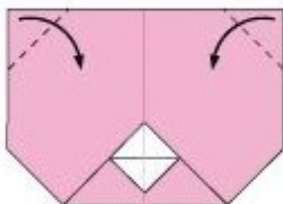
**3** Fold in half



**4** Fold in the dotted line

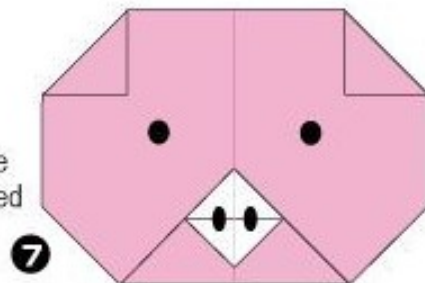


**5** Fold in the dotted line

Draw a face and finished



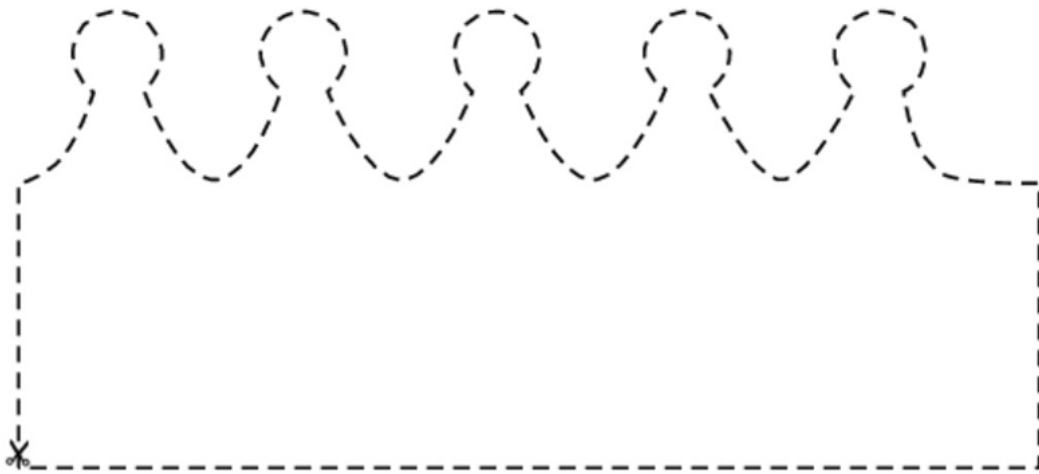
